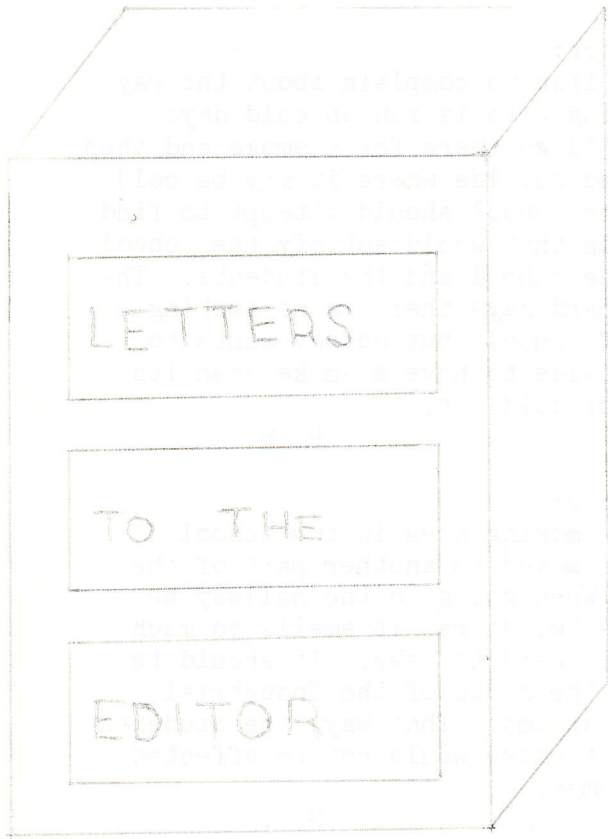
Two separate camps went out, each consisting of about ten boys and ten girls.

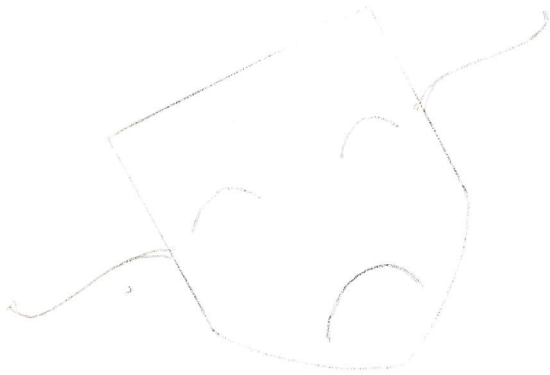

SCIENCE LOOKS NORTH

Work, though it entailed, I felt privileged to attend the Ninth Provincial Seminar in Science on behalf of McNally. This week long session of discussion provided me with the opportunity to acquire more factual, complete and less-biased information about the Canadian North, and also gave me the chance to collect my wide-scattered thoughts on the subject and to shape them into a more concrete policy.

The seminar in science is intended to give the students an opportunity to see the sciences as they relate to world problems--either in creating or solving them. The United Nations and its agencies is considered as it deals with these problems, or as it may in the future. An opportunity to broaden one's understanding of science and world affairs, and the chance to meet with other interested students are also provided to those attending the seminar. In the words of the Director, Dr. Walter Litven, "thus, they (those attending) may return to their respective schools and communities with a more intelligent interest in world problems in general. The well - in formed youth of today are the intelligent leaders of tomorrow."

We were provided with adequate rooms and excellent meals at St. Stevens College on the University campus. We also held our discussion groups and lectures in this building.

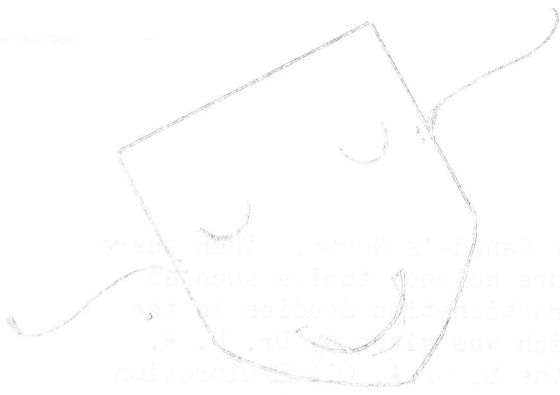
The program on the theme "Science Looks North" itself was wide and varied. Highly topical illustrated lectures by people from nearly all fields of endeavor in the north, were presented in order that we might be able to contribute more easily to the discussion groups, from which most of the conclusions about the role of Science in the North, came. For example, Dr. Borguild, the Chief Health Officer for all of Greenland, spoke on the problems encountered under his jurisdiction. Dr. Brian Brett followed with an insight look into the health

problems of Canada's North. Then there were the pure science topics such as "Isotope Fractionation Studies in the North", which was given by Dr. H. R. Krouse of the U. of A. Oil Exploration and Wildlife Studies were also given their place on the agenda. But, the seminar did not only deal with scientific matters, for the role of the natives in the development of the North, a Sociological problem, was rated high on the list of achievements. The Group Discussions, which I have already mentioned, also played their part. These were composed of between 10 and 15 individuals under the guidance of a discussion leader. Here the problems and possible solutions were looked into. However, it was not all work and no play.

Freedom was the key word at this year's seminar. Curfew was set at midnight, a most reasonable hour considering that each person was responsible for getting up at seven-thirty and lasting through till night. Tours of the campus helped vary the pace. As well, excursions to place of relevance to the topic, were included on the program of events. Friday night's Student Night was preempted so that a dance on campus could be taken in, and the curfew was extended to two-thirty. In all, the needs of all were well attended to.

In the words of Mr. Litven, "The theme science looks north is timely and topical. Similarly, the seminar itself is timely and topical. It comes at a time where the young persons thoughts on matters of worldly importance are just starting to jell into a policy which will in all likelihood determine his position on such matters in the future. And thus, the scope and depth, as well as the unbiased nature of the seminar, help us to attain logical and reasonable thought processes with which to overcome future obstacles.

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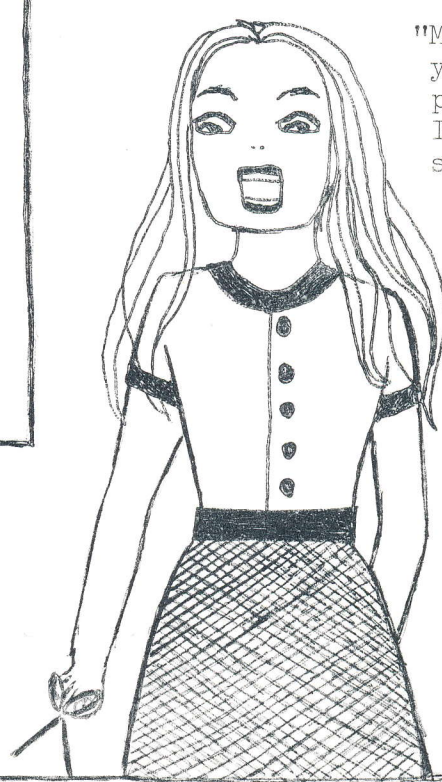
