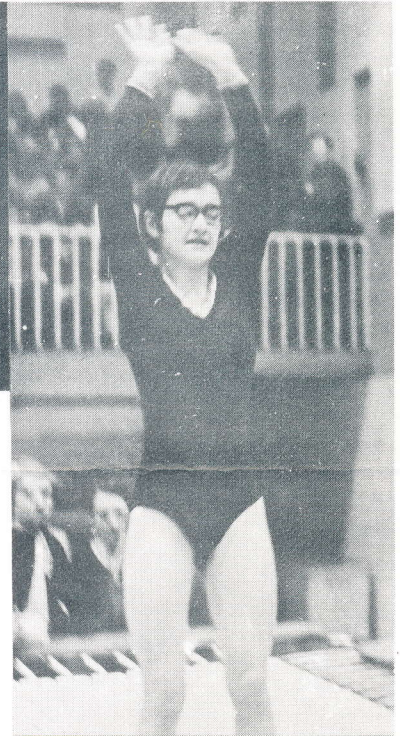
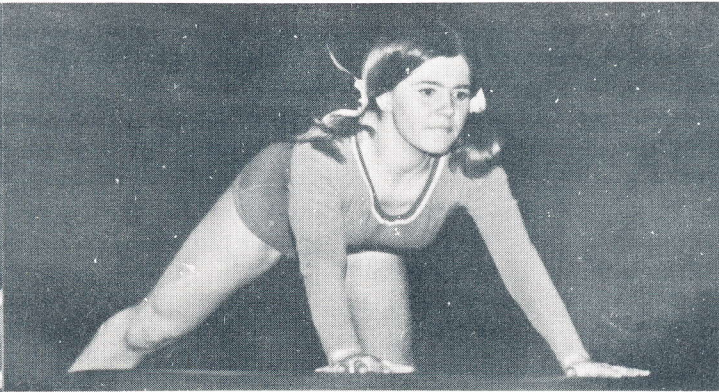

CITY FINAL GYMNASTICS

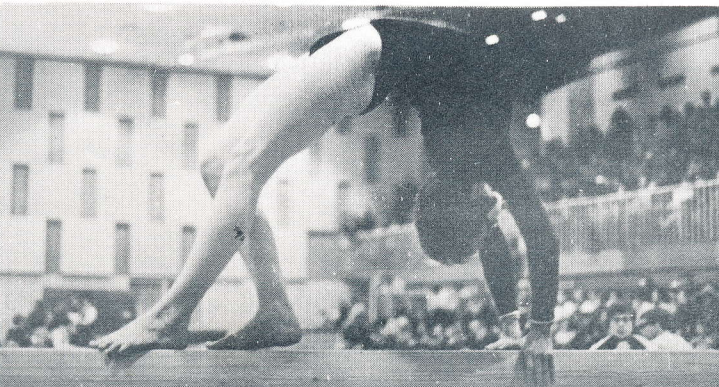
